






We all know people who use drugs

While many of us have different views on using drugs, we can all agree that keeping people safe – and alive – is the highest priority.





Did you know?

- → In 2019 almost half of Australians aged 14 and over more than ten million people admitted to having used a drug illicitly in their lifetime*
- → 16.4% admitted to using an illicit drug in the last 12 months
- → If we actually arrested everyone who admitted to using an illicit drug in the past 12 months, we would have to arrest over one million people

And this is before we talk about the use of legal drugs like alcohol and tobacco.

Did you also know?

- → Five people die every day from drug-related overdoses in Australia*
- → In 2020 drug-related overdoses exceeded Australia's national road toll with over 1,800 drug-related deaths
- → Attempts to eliminate drug use through prohibition and abstinence-only approaches have failed globally, resulting in tens of thousands of preventable deaths each year
- → You could say that the 'war on drugs' is really a war against ourselves

Harm Reduction is both a philosophy and a pragmatic approach that

- Saves Lives
- ✓ Values Human Rights
- ✓ Takes a Non-Judgmental Approach





Examples of Harm Reduction include

- → Pill testing informing people of potentially dangerous substances that they didn't intend on taking
- → Needle & Syringe Programs preventing blood-borne viruses like HIV and hepatitis C
- → Opioid Treatment Programs supporting people who are dealing with drug dependency issues
- → Medically Supervised Injecting Centres demonstrated to prevent overdoses, save lives and reduce public drug use



Harm Reduction neither condemns nor condones drug use

Instead, harm reduction accepts that drug use is a reality and seeks to meet people where they're at, right now...

...not where someone else would like them to be

Harm Reduction is highly cost-effective

Every \$1 invested in harm reduction returns between \$5 – \$14 in saved public health costs.

Dollar for dollar there is no better public health investment.



What we've achieved

- → Conducted Australia's first legal pill testing trial at a festival and secured the first fixed-site pill testing service in the ACT
- → Successfully advocated for a high-level government review into problems with the quality and accessibility of opioid dependence treatment in Australia
- → Advocated for take home naloxone (the overdose reversal drug) to be freely available over-the-counter saving thousands of lives



What we're planning to do

- → Expand frontline harm reduction services by advocating for increased funding for harm reduction (currently at less than 5% of drug policy expenditure)
- → Reduce drug-related overdose deaths by advocating for comprehensive overdose prevention approaches and the availability of pill testing services in all states and territories in Australia
- → Reduce barriers to opioid dependence treatment by ensuring governments remove unfair and unregulated consumer fees that make drug treatment unaffordable for many vulnerable Australians
